# Dear Sir or Madam:

We continue to represent Lower LLC ("Lower") located at 8621 Robert Fulton Drive, Suite 150 Columbia, MD 21046. We write to supplement our August 2, 2022 notice to your office. By providing this notice, Lower does not waive any rights or defenses regarding the applicability of Delaware law, the applicability of the Delaware data event notification statute, or personal jurisdiction.

On January 14, 2022 Lower began providing written notice of this incident to potentially affected individuals. Additional written notices were mailed on February 24, 2022, which included five (5) Delaware residents, on May 27, 2022, which included three hundred sixty-four (364) Delaware residents, and August 2, 2022, which included four hundred forty-three (443) Delaware residents. On or about September 6, 2022, Lower's investigation determined that the name and Social Security number of an additional six (6) Delaware residents were present on involved systems. Lower also stores information in its systems such as date of birth, driver's license number, and financial account number. Therefore, it is possible some of this information may have also been on an involved system if an individual provided it to Lower. Lower will continue with its notification efforts by mailing notices on October 6, 2022, to the additional six (6) Delaware residents in substantially the same form as the letter attached here as *Exhibit A*.

Dear Sample A. Sample:

Lower LLC ("Lower") is writing to make you aware of an incident that may affect the security of some of your information. We take this incident seriously and write to provide you with information about the incident, what we are doing in response, and the resources that are available to you to help better protect your personal information from possible misuse, should you feel it is appropriate to do so.

What Happened? On December 14, 2021, Lower identified unusual activity on its network and began an investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists. On December 17, 2021, the investigation determined that an unauthorized actor accessed the Lower network and removed certain files from the network sometime between December 10, 2021 and December 14, 2021. The investigation later identified suspicious activity relating to a limited number of employee email accounts between September 2, 2021 and December 16, 2021. We reviewed the files and email accounts for sensitive information. We then began reviewing our records and taking steps to identify address information for purposes of providing notice of this incident to those whose information is potentially affected. On September 6, 2022, we completed our most recent review effort.

What Information Was Involved? The ongoing review of the involved Lower systems identified your name and Social Security number. Lower also stores information on our systems such as date of birth, driver's license number, and financial account number. Therefore, it is possible some of this information may have also been on an involved system if you provided it to Lower.

What We Are Doing. We take this incident and the security of information within our care seriously. Upon discovery of this incident, we launched an in-depth investigation with the assistance of third-party forensic specialists to determine the full nature and scope of this incident. As part of our ongoing commitment to the privacy of information in our care, we are reviewing our existing policies and procedures and implementing additional safeguards to further secure the information in our systems as appropriate. We notified law enforcement and are notifying regulatory authorities as required by law. We are also notifying potentially affected individuals, including you, so that you may take further steps to best protect your personal information, should you feel it is appropriate to do so. As an added precaution, we arranged to have Experian provide credit monitoring services for ## months at no cost to you.

What You Can Do. We encourage you to remain vigilant against incidents of identity theft and fraud by reviewing your account statements and monitoring your free credit reports for suspicious activity and to detect errors over the next 12 to 24 months. Please also review the information contained in the enclosed "Steps You Can Take to Help Protect Your Personal Information." You may also enroll in the complimentary identity credit monitoring services we are making available to you. Enrollment instructions are attached to this letter.

### **Monitor Your Accounts**

Under U.S. law, a consumer is entitled to one free credit report annually from each of the three major credit reporting bureaus, Equifax, Experian, and TransUnion. To order your free credit report, visit <a href="https://www.annualcreditreport.com">www.annualcreditreport.com</a> or call, toll-free, 1-877-322-8228. You may also directly contact the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below to request a free copy of your credit report.

Consumers have the right to place an initial or extended "fraud alert" on a credit file at no cost. An initial fraud alert is a 1-year alert that is placed on a consumer's credit file. Upon seeing a fraud alert display on a consumer's credit file, a business is required to take steps to verify the consumer's identity before extending new credit. If you are a victim of identity theft, you are entitled to an extended fraud alert, which is a fraud alert lasting seven years. Should you wish to place a fraud alert, please contact any one of the three major credit reporting bureaus listed below.

As an alternative to a fraud alert, consumers have the right to place a "credit freeze" on a credit report, which will prohibit a credit bureau from releasing information in the credit report without the consumer's express authorization. The credit freeze is designed to prevent credit, loans, and services from being approved in your name without your consent. However, you should be aware that using a credit freeze to take control over who gets access to the personal and financial information in your credit report may delay, interfere with, or prohibit the timely approval of any subsequent request or application you make regarding a new loan, credit, mortgage, or any other account involving the extension of credit. Pursuant to federal law, you cannot be charged to place or lift a credit freeze on your credit report. To request a credit freeze, you will need to provide the following information:

- 1. Full name (including middle initial as well as Jr., Sr., II, III, etc.);
- 2. Social Security number;
- 3. Date of birth;
- 4. Addresses for the prior two to five years;
- 5. Proof of current address, such as a current utility bill or telephone bill;
- 6. A legible photocopy of a government-issued identification card (state driver's license or ID card, etc.); and
- 7. A copy of either the police report, investigative report, or complaint to a law enforcement agency concerning identity theft if you are a victim of identity theft.
